Initiative Supports Maker-Oriented Summer and After School Programs For Students in the United States

Maker Corps, a new program developed by the Maker Education Initiative, will hire college students to serve as mentors and educators to children in summer and after school programs inspired by the Maker Movement, a broad-based community that celebrates the art of designing and building things, either doing-it-yourself (DIY) or with others (DIWO).

Makers are driven by the challenge of the projects they tackle, while also engaging in design- and project-based learning that can nurture creativity and develop proficiency in the science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) disciplines. As makers themselves, Maker Corps members bring their own enthusiasm and knowledge about how to learn by doing. They will be trained to engage children in creative projects that develop problemsolving skills in ways that make science and technology fun. Like camp counselors, they will gain the experience of serving as community leaders.

The Maker Education Initiative, a non-profit dedicated to the idea that every child is a maker, was launched in May 2012 at Maker Faire Bay Area with the support of Cognizant, one of its founding partners. The group will oversee the Maker Corps program and be responsible for the overall recruitment and execution of the program.

"Cognizant is delighted to support Maker Corps, a program that shares our commitment to bringing making into the lives of children around the United States," said Mark Greenlaw, Vice President of Sustainability and Educational Affairs at Cognizant, and a member of the Maker Education Initiative's Advisory Board. Cognizant supports Maker Corps as part of its current education initiative, <u>Making the Future</u>, created to unleash the passion of young people in STEM disciplines by creating fun, hands-on learning opportunities. The first 100 Maker Corps members will be placed in the summer of 2013, growing to over 1,000 deployed members by 2015. Maker Corps will work with science centers, children's museums, schools, and youth serving organizations to engage children in meaningful maker-oriented activities. Initial partners who plan to collaborate on this project include the New York Hall of Science, the Children's Museum of Houston, the Children's Museum of Pittsburgh, the Science Museum of Minnesota, the Exploratorium, the Henry Ford, and Science City at Union Station, Kansas City.

Today's announcement will be made during the final session of the Clinton Global Initiative America—"What's Next?: Towards a More Perfect Union"—which will explore America's economic identity in an increasingly globalized world, as well as what can be done to ensure a creative, innovative, and sustainable tomorrow.
